Sa pagdaan ng inyong mga araw bilang Isko at Iska. mapapansin ninyo na ang unibersidad ay punong-puno ng mga hamon sa inyong kakayahan at mga gawaing magaaral na magmumulat ng inyong mga mata at magpapalawak ng inyong pang-unawa sa kalakhang lipunan. Makikilala at makakahalubilo ninyo ang iba't ibang uri ng tao-mga guro, kapwa mag-aaral, atbp.-na magpapayaman ng inyong kaalaman sa kapaligiran. Magkakaroon kayo ng mga bagong kaibigan, kakilala, mga kasamahan sa mga aktibidad sa eskuwela o maging sa mga hanapbuhay sa hinaharap. Baka nga dito rin ninyo makilala ang inyong magiging kabiyak. Maliban sa seryosong pag-aaral at pagsusunog ng kilay, maraming maaaring gawin o salihang aktibidad—mula sa iba't ibang larangan ng sining gaya ng musika, teatro, sayaw; mga gawain at paligsahan sa palakasan; mga samahang akademiko, politikal, ispiritwal, pang-kalikasan, pangkasarian; at samu't saring aktibidad na kumakatawan sa iba'tibang interes, hilig at paniniwala. Gaya ng nabanggit na namin sa inyo nuong orientation, kabilang sa aming mga serbisyo ang soholarships, tutorials, counseling at guidance o pagpapayo at paggabay, dormitoryo, pag-aalagang pangkalusugan at pang-nutrisyon, pagsubaybay sa mga organisasyong pang-mag-aaral, tulong pinansiyal, atbp.

Ang mga yunit sa ilalim ng OVCSA—Office of Counseling and Guidance (OCG), Office of Student Housing (OSH), Office of Scholarships and Student Services (OSS), Office of Student Activities (OSA), Student Disciplinary Tribunal (SDT), University Health Service (UHS), University Food Service (UFS), Diliman Learning Resource Center (DLRC) at UP-DOST Core Group—ay laging naririyan at nakahandang tumulong upang maayos ninyong magampanan at matapos ang inyong tungkulin bilang Iskolar ng Bayan.

The following are units under the OVCSA located at Vinzons Hall:

Office of Student Activities (OSA)—coordinates projects of student organizations. It processes the official recognition papers of university-based organizations, provides technical assistance for organization projects, functions as an information center and serves as the coordinating body between student organizations and non-UP groups in cooperative activities. OSA also attends to the needs and concerns of about 200 international students enrolled at UPD each year in aspects such as admission, visas, study permits, housing and keeps track of their academic progress. It is located at the Annex, and may be reached at telephone number 981-8500 local 4507 and 4508.

Office of Scholarships and Student Services (0SSS)—implements the Socialized Tuition and Financial Assistance Program (STRAP), administers government funded and private scholarships and offers a number of financial assistance programs. The STFAP grants qualified students subsidies covering tuition, laboratory and miscellaneous fees based on a student's financial needs and capacity to pay. Other financial assistance programs include tuition loans, short-term cash loans and student assistantships. OSSS is located at Rooms 301 to 305, with telephone number 981-8500 locals 4503 to 4504.

Office of Student Housing (OSH)—manages the 10 residence halls or dormitories on campus. Of the 10 dormitories, five are co-educational. Kalayaan (exclusively for freshmen), Ipil (graduate students), Molave, Yakal and the International Center (foreign students). Four are exclusively for women, namely Ilang-Ilang, Kamia, Sampaguita and Sanggumay (graduate students). Narra is exclusively for males. The OSS likewise maintains a list of houses on campus accepting boarders or lodgers. OSH is at Room 201 and may be reached at telephone number 981-850 local 4510.

Office of Counseling and Guidance (OCG)—offers free professional counseling, psychological testing and human resource development programs to students, faculty and administrative staff. OCG is located at Room 307 with telephone numbers 929-5835 (direct line) or 981-8500 locals 4501 and 4502.

Student Disciplinary Tribunal (SDT)—conducts hearings on cases involving violations of student rules and regulations and keeps records of such cases. The SDT likewise issues clearances and certificates of good moral character and offers free legal advice. SDT is housed at Rooms 202 to 204 with telephone number 981-8500 local 4509

University Food Service (UFS)—provides food that is nutritious, safe, wholesome and reasonably priced. The UFS operates three outlets, namely the Bakeshop offering pastries, cakes and cookies; Vinzons Grill, serving lunch and snacks; and the Catering Unit, which services food requirements for different occasions. All three units of the UFS are located at the Ground Floor and may be reached at 981-8509 locals 4513 and 45144.

In addition to the above units, Vinzons Hall houses the Philippine Collegian, the official student publication of the UPD. It is located at fourth floor, with telephone number 981-8500 local 4222.

Adjacent to the Collegian are the offices of the University Student Council (USC), the body of elected student officials who endeavor to address student, campus and national issues during their 1-year term. The USC also attempts to maximize student participation in University activities through various venues such as symposia, cultural shows, sports festivals, group discussions and student assemblies. The USC offices are at Rooms 205 to 206, with telephone number 981-8500 local 4521.

The OVCSA has two other units not located at Vinzons Hall. These are:


The Diliman Learning Resource Center (DLRC)—offers free tutorials in Math, Chemistry, Physics and Communication. It also has programs to help students adjust to their learning and social environments. The DLRC is designed to supplement, complement and coordinate the learning assistance programs to ensure that the goal of promoting academic excellence is realized in a more caring and nurturing environment.

At the DILC, the UP-DOST Core Group attends to RA7687, scholars or the Department of Science and Technology (DOST) scholars enrolled at UPD. The group monitors the scholars academic performance, facilitates the release of their stipends and manages the Science and Technology Learning Assistance Program. The service unit was established in 1997 through a memorandum of agreement between UP and the DOST.

Both the DLRC and the DILC are located at Kamia Residence Hall, and may be reached at telephone number 9275802.

University Health Service (UHS)—operates a 50-bed primary hospital capable of handling simple, uncomplicated and stable medical conditions. It promotes general health and well-being by providing physical and medical examinations, immunizations and medical consultations on weekdays in the following specializations: internal medicine, general surgery, neurology, OB-Gyne, psychiatry, allegology-immunology and dermatology. It is located along J. P. Laurel St., across the Parish of the Holy Sacrifice and the Shopping Center and may be reached at telephone numbers 928-3608 or 981-8500 with locals 2701 and 2072.

"Matatapang, matatalino. . . walang takot kahit kanino. . . ganyan kaming mga taga- UP!"



A UP education is more than a degree from a prestigious university. Alongside acquiring an expertise or a vocation, one learns precious life skills: critical thinking, independence, cooperation and survival.

For unlike other colleges or universities, UPD is more than a learning institution: it is a community where academics and scholars interact daily with most, if not all strata of Philippine society. This is largely due to the peculiar composition of its constituents and its unique physical make-up.

The teaching complement of the whole UP System has been described as "the finest collection of brains" in the country and it is for good reason. UP has the biggest critical mass of faculty with master's and doctorate degrees, since UP encourages its faculty members to pursue graduate studies at its various campuses and prestigious universities abroad.

Enrolment at UPD is truly heterogeneous, where students admitted are a mix of public, science, state, private and even foreign high school graduates. Geographically, UPD students come from all regions in the country, with a greater number coming from the National Capital Region. A good number of foreign students are also enrolled. In terms of economic status, the student population represents annual family incomes ranging from P100,000 or less to more than P1 million.

Thus, one has the chance to interface with the whole range of Philippine society: heirs of political dynasties chauffeured in single digit SUVs, hijab-covered scholars from the South, PhilAms (Pinoy Americans) with call center accents, kolehiyalas speaking in affected Taglish, promdis (from the provinces) with thick regional accents, and students working part-time in various UPD administration offices.

Outside the classroom, one comes face to face with the harsher realities of life: little girls selling scoongies (pony tail holders) at the Main Library and at the CASAA canteen; boys begging for leftover food at the UP Cooperative canteen; men, women and children scavenging for empty water bottles, styrophor and assorted recyclable containers; and vendors peddling assorted goods such as banana cue, monay, taho, balut, "dirty" ice cream, pirated DVDs, books, pearls, cookware and electronic gadgets, among others.

There is more to the campus than its core, the Academic Oval, or the peripheral areas serviced by the Ikot and Toki jeeps. The university sits on a 493-hectare property, cut almost in half by Commonwealth Ave. Towards Fairview, UPD's lands cover the Petron gas station, the defunct carnival and the Asian Institute of Tourism (AIT). Beyond these areas are the Arboretum, touted as the last virgin forest this side of Metro Manila, the National Hydraulics Research Center and a large, unauthorized middle-class residential area. Other than tourism or hydraulics engineering majors, students do not usually frequent these areas.

Within the campus proper, the university's property starts from Philcoa and covers the commercial spaces and the Bliss housing site behind it. It extends all the way to Balara along Katipunan Ave., to the UP housing units along Pook Amorsolo and the Sikatuna Bliss housing site.

Within this vast land resource are areas marked for the university's academic and administrative functions, student dormitories, housing for faculty and staff,

technology and science complexes, commercial use and recreation. The seemingly large pockets of open spaces are actually reserved for future academic use.

Along the periphery are teeming squatter colonies, most of which are skillfully camouflaged by thick tall grasses and bushes. In 2005, it was estimated that more than 20,000 squatter families have laid claim to 66 hectares of UP property, and were concentrated in 15 areas along the major thoroughfares. Krus na Ligas, the busy commercial/residential area that thrives on board and lodging accommodations for students, was once part of the UP property.

Reclaiming land usurped by illegal settlers has been a priority of successive UP administration officials. It is a long, difficult, expensive and often dangerous undertaking.

Being a government institution, the University's grounds are open to the general public. Daily, hundreds of motorists cut through the campus to avoid traffic along Commonwealth Ave. or Katipunan Ave. Five public transportation routes traverse UPD: the Ikot, Toki, Philcoa, Katipunan and SM North jeeps, carrying hundreds of people in and out of the campus.

Visitors, passers-by and anyone may enter the grounds for whatever purposes, except of course buildings and facilities used by the university. On Sundays, when motorized vehicles are banned from the Academic Oval, the Sunken Garden and the Lagoon are transformed into picnic and recreation grounds where cyclists, joggers, athletes, golfers and the like, many with families and dogs in tow, enjoy nature and the relatively unpolluted air. The crowd, in turn, attracts those eager to make a living—the vendors, peddlers and even petty criminals.

Two public events swell UPD's population: the nightly concerts at the UP Fair in February, and the Lantern Parade in December.

Thus, UPD is much like any regular district or barangay, where the vagaries of day to day living, even the unpleasant, can happen, sometimes intruding into one's scholarly pursuits. The UPD Police blotters are chock-full of reports of petty thefts and crimes committed on students, faculty and employees: cellular phone snatching, pickpockets, hold-up in jeeps, akyat-bahay, drug use, drug pushing, and in isolated cases, even homicide or murder.

Administration officials have been pushing the envelope to make the campus safer and more secure, particularly for its legitimate constituents. To beef up its police force, a Special Services Brigade (SSB) is deployed to the Academic Oval and adjacent areas 24 hours daily. At any given time, eight men, garbed in neon orange vests and armed with wooden batons, whistles, handcuffs and flashlights (at night) patrol the area on foot to shadow and

accost suspicious-looking characters. Persons loitering in dark areas and around Vinzons Hall beyond 10 p.m. are asked to show identification; those not connected with the university are asked to leave. Should an incident occur, the SSB reports the matter to the UPD Police, who will take over. The SSB also escorts students using the Main Library on extended hours back to their dorms.

In addition, both sidewalks flanking the streets encircling the Academic Oval and certain areas in the Sunken Garden and the Lagoon have been fully illuminated by 70-watt high pressure sodium (HPS) bulbs. These lights exhibit higher contrast and better detail perception, making it easier to sense movement and identify objects and persons in the dark.

To contain traffic, UPD closed seven minor access roads and opened only the University Ave., Osmeña Ave. Magsaysay Ave. and E. Jacinto St. to pedestrians and vehicles until 10 p.m since March 2004. By 10 p.m., the campus may only be accessed through the University Ave.

Stricter security measures have been implemented by the colleges themselves, starting with the "No ID No Entry" policy in all buildings. In most colleges, only one or two gates are open, where guards dutifully inspect the bags of all those seeking to enter its premises.

If these were not enough, the administration and college officials themselves tirelessly reiterate that safety is everyone's concern, and advise all constituents to take special precautions, particularly in areas densely populated by informal settlers, and in vulnerable open spaces. These areas include Philcoa itself, where numerous incidents of pickpocket and snatching have been reported; the stretch of the University Ave. from Philcoa to C.P. García Ave. along Barangay San Vicente; Ylanan Road at the College of Human Kinetics leading to Commonwealth Ave. and the footbridge connecting the AIT to the campus proper. However, there have been reported cases of petty theft within the colleges themselves, totally discounting the possibility of attributing the crimes exclusively to outsiders or to "non-UP."

Despite the sometimes florid picture of UPD painted by the media, the campus remains a haven for scholars and academics. It is the last remaining space for free expression, for the unhampered pursuit of truth and knowledge, and the best training ground for bigger challenges in life, which is an opportunity offered only to a privileged few, for the best and the brightest.

After the residency, Twigg will present his explorations in "lan Fairweather in the Philippines." He will mainly feature seven scrolls of reproduced artwork of Fairweather. In addition, historic and contemporary photographs and artworks by other artists similar to the oriental influence of Fairweather's artworks will also be shown. Fellow artists regard Ian Fairweather as Australia's greatest painter of all time, in addition to having an exciting, tragic, extremely diverse and interesting life. He was born in Scotland in 1891, extensively traveled during his years of early education, attended an officer training school and became a POW during WWI. He studied art in Holland, London, Munich, the Hague Academy, privately with Johannes van Mastenbroek, the School of Oriental Studies, and the Slade School in London. Fairweather arrived in Melbourne, Australia in 1934, and much later that year, he traveled to the Philippines. Here he acquired the oriental sense of space vis-à-vis European context. This became

the prevailing feature in his paintings from this period onwards. Fairweather achieved what few artists have accomplished—the combination of western and Asian influences in his work. Among these few artists who combined Western and Asian influences are American artist Mark Tobey and Filipino National Artist Edades. (June 27 to August 13 at The Lobby, UP Jorge B. Vargas Museum.
